Presidents message

Over the past decade, we have witnessed considerable progress in advocating for and supporting the 2SLGBTQIA+ community in Oxford County. This journey began with a meeting to discuss concerns, where I met Phil Vandermolen, who would become a valuable partner in establishing the Oxford County Pride Committee.

Our mission has been to advocate, educate, and promote social, leisure, and recreational activities for the 2SLGBTQIA+ community in Oxford County. The committee has not only met its initial goals but exceeded expectations by fostering diversity, equity, and inclusion within the community. Our annual Pride Family Day has grown into a summer highlight, attracting increasing numbers of families, businesses, and organizations.

Since our first flag raising in 2015, progress Pride flags are now flown in every community throughout Oxford County. Despite facing challenges such as hate, homophobia, transphobia, and stolen flags, we have strengthened community connections through education and advocacy.

Reflecting on the past decade, the first five years were comparatively easier than the latter half. Political changes and regression in human rights in the USA have influenced Canadian policies, exemplified by Alberta's stance on parental rights for families with transgender children, perpetuates stereotypes making life dangerous for the 2SLGBTQIA+ community. This shift has necessitated greater security measures at our events post-COVID-19.

Despite these obstacles, change brings progress and opportunity. It is crucial to resist divisive propaganda and rhetoric, preserving the legacy of those who fought for our rights. As my mother wisely stated, "We all bleed the same color and breathe the same air."

With a heavy heart, I announce my retirement from the role of Oxford County Pride President, effective October 2025. Serving this community has been an honor, and I am grateful for the relationships built along the way. From a small picnic in Southside Park to hosting numerous events and a Family day with over fifty vendors and hundreds of people in attendance, the growth and impact of Oxford County Pride fills me with pride.


Our efforts have included installing rainbow crosswalks, providing safe space training, participating in community organization vendor opportunities, and raising flags in all townships during June. These initiatives aim to influence perspectives on discrimination and prejudice positively.

Oxford Pride over the past ten years. PRISM is a one-of-a-kind mentoring program run by Big Brothers Big Sisters of Oxford County that's unlike any other service for 2S/LGBTQ+ youth in the County. While other organizations exist that support 2S/LGBTQ+ youth in Oxford, none of them aim to provide 2S/LGBTQ+ youth with a 2S/LGBTQ+ mentor who can support them as they navigate life's challenges.

PRISM stands for Pride, Respect, Identity, Safety, and Mentoring. The PRISM program matches 2S/LGBTQ+ adults with 2SLGBTQ+ youth in one-to-one, in-school, virtual, or group mentoring relationships. All members of the match receive pre-match training, where they are taught about how



to create healthy and safe relationships. Our matches also receive ongoing support from our experienced team of mentoring coordinators. Mentors are all trained how to build and maintain developmentally significant relationships; through regular and fun weekly meetings with their mentee. Matches are created based on common interests and shared identity traits to create a supportive, empowering, and fun friendship.

Traditionally, the 2S/LGBTQ+ community has created informal mentoring networks to endure the hardship we often experience. Despite huge strides in acceptance and equality, we know that 2S/LGBTQ people in Oxford experience frequent mistreatment. There is a pressing need for evidence based mentoring programs like ours that foster the growth and positive development of all young people.

Mentors in our program often share that being a mentor is an enriching and rewarding experience. Serving as a mentor provides you with an opportunity to meet new people in the 2S/LGBTQ+ community, while improving your own wellbeing. Being a mentor is one of

the most fun ways to support the young people in your community. We have various programs with their own levels of commitment, some require as little as an hour a week of your time.

We have many 2S/LGBTQ+ youth on our waitlist who are ready to seize the opportunity to be mentored. Are you an 2S/LGBTQ+ adult or ally looking to give back to the 2S/LGBTQ+ community? If so, becoming a mentor with the PRISM program might be what you've been waiting for.





TOGETHER WE ALL SUCCEED

Advancing 2SLGBTQIA+ Health in Oxford County – Oxford and Elgin County Rainbow Research



Despite major strides in 2SLGBTQIA+ rights, many in our

communities still face discrimination, healthcare barriers, and stressors that affect both mental and physical health. This year, a local initiative is aiming to conduct research aimed at improving health and well-being for 2SLGBTQIA+ folks in Oxford and Elgin Counties. Through a partnership between Wilfrid Laurier University, the Oxford County's Rainbow Coalition, Elgin County Pride, and Southwestern Public Health, this research project is one of the first of its kind in our region. The project is specifically exploring the unique health challenges faced by sexual orientation and gender identity/expression (SOGIE) diverse communities in rural-urban settings—communities too often left out of national conversations.

The Oxford-Elgin Rainbow Research initiative is working to change that by collecting both screening survey data and in-depth interviews asking about lived experiences to uncover where supports are most needed—and how to make them happen. Through this, our research team is dedicated to co-creating solutions with our local communities.

And we want to hear from YOU! The research team will be on-site at Pride this year, recruiting for one-on-one interviews and signing people up for our brief screening survey about 2SLGBTQIA+ health and experiences in the region. To be eligible, participants must be 16 years of age or older, live in either Oxford or Elgin County, and identify under the 2SLGBTQIA+ umbrella. Your voice matters—and your story can help build a healthier, more inclusive Oxford County.

Let's celebrate visibility, connection, and progress together!



Reclaiming Our Sacredness: The Enduring Spirit of Two-Spirit and IndigiQueer Peoples

Long before colonial ships touched the shores of Turtle Island, the vibrant spectrum of human identity, including gender and sexuality, was not merely tolerated – it was woven into the sacred fabric of Creation. Being queer, trans, or non-binary was understood and deeply respected. Across countless Indigenous Nations, those we might now encompass under the umbrella of 2SLGBTQQIA+ often walked paths of profound significance – as healers, warriors, artisans, peacekeepers, and vital ceremonial leaders. Two-Spirit and IndigiQueer people have always been here, each Nation holding unique terms and understandings for these valued members of their communities. In my own culture, Ojibwe, we say Niizh Manidoowag, translating to Two Spirit.

This specific term, Niizh Manidoowag, gained broader recognition following a pivotal gathering in 1990 – the third annual Native American/First Nations Gay and Lesbian Conference in Winnipeg. An Elder shared a vision, gifting this term to empower our Indigenous LGBTQ+ relations and intentionally replace the deeply derogatory colonial labels used against us since the 1600s. It was embraced as a term that could unite the diverse, nation-specific identities that existed long before European contact – identities like Iskwêw Ka Napêwayat in Cree, Winyanktehca in Lakota, or Nádleehi in Diné.

Tragically, the arrival of colonizers brought with it a forceful wave of destructive ideologies. Homophobia, biphobia, and transphobia – foreign concepts rooted in patriarchal and rigid religious doctrines – were brutally imposed through tools like residential schools and relentless religious indoctrination. Colonization sought to shatter diversity and enforce a homogenous worldview, violently suppressing anyone who did not fit its narrow mold. The insidious ripple effects of these colonial weapons continue today, embedding themselves within the very fabric of our social, legal, medical, educational, and even religious systems – systems whose failures and harmful legacies have been starkly documented by inquiries like the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) and the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls (MMIWG). These imposed ideologies perpetuate cycles of harm and marginalization against Queer and BIPOC peoples, a direct violation of the inherent rights the TRC (Call #18) and MMIWG reports demand be recognized.

Let us be unequivocally clear: the phobia directed at Two-Spirit people is not Indigenous. It is a colonial construct, a poison that fuels intergenerational trauma – the very trauma the TRC called for healing centres to address (Call #21) – ignites devastating lateral violence within our own communities, contributes to heartbreakingly high suicide rates, and continues to steal our beloved 2Spirit and IndigiQueer relatives from us. This violence is precisely what the MMIWG Inquiry investigated, demanding a National Action Plan (Call 1.1) to protect Indigenous women, girls, and 2SLGBTQQIA+ people. Every life lost to hate, and misunderstanding is a precious gift denied to Creation itself. We must scream it from the rooftops: Our Queer youth DESERVE to grow up to become cherished Queer Elders! We must demand the specific supports and resources for 2SLGBTQQIA+ youth and survivors that the MMIWG Calls for Justice insist upon (Call 4.5).

Yet, even amidst this painful legacy, the sacred wisdom endures. A Wabanaki creation story resonates deeply with me: the hero Gluskabe shot an arrow into a brown ash tree, splitting both the tree and its spirit. This spirit, now in two parts, agreed to be transformed into human beings. Gluskabe breathed life into them, and the first Wabanaki man and woman emerged. But fragments of each essence remained. Gluskabe, wasting nothing, recombined these essences and breathed life once more, sending the first Two-Spirit person out from the tree. In this understanding, Two-Spirit people are inherently whole, never separated from themselves, a testament to the sacredness of their being from the very beginning. In Ceremony, I have been taught that we are all spiritual beings navigating a human experience. Each of us holds a place within the sacred circle of the Medicine Wheel, bound by the responsibility to act with compassion, love, and empathy. These are not abstract ideals; they are living principles handed down through generations, like the Seven Grandfather Teachings gifted to my Anishinaabe relations: Zaagi'idiwin (Love), Manaaji'idiwin (Respect), Zoongide'e (Courage), Gwayakwaadiziwin (Honesty), Nibwaakaawin (Wisdom), Dabasendizowin (Humility), and Debwewin (Truth). These teachings form the foundation for the culturally safe healing practices the TRC urged governments to recognize and utilize (Call #22).

These teachings are the seeds of healing and resurgence. Let us carry them forward, planting them wide and deep within our circles and communities. Let us actively work to wash away the harmful, colonial belief systems that still linger, striving to create a future where our young ones can live safely, freely, and in glorious celebration of their authentic selves. This requires dismantling colonial structures and actively decolonizing our own spaces to fully embrace our 2SLGBTQQIA+ kin, as demanded by the MMIWG Calls for Justice (Call 15.2). It means demanding the mandatory, age-appropriate education on Indigenous history and rights – including the specific experiences of 2SLGBTQQIA+ people – that both the TRC (Call #62) and MMIWG (Call 11.1) identified as crucial for reconciliation and understanding. It requires properly funded, Indigenous-centred health and wellness services that are explicitly culturally safe for our 2SLGBTQQIA+ relatives (MMIWG Call 2.3). This is not just hope; it is our sacred duty. This is the call to justice.

Let us offer a profound Chi-Miigwech – a big thank you – to the Elders who fiercely protected and carried forward the sacred teachings for our 2S relations. Chi-Miigwech to our courageous youth who are undertaking the vital work of self-discovery, reclaiming teachings, and leading the charge as powerful facilitators of decolonization – embodying the empowerment the MMIWG Calls for Justice seek to support (Call 4.8). And Chi-Miigwech to every single person who loves, protects, supports, teaches, validates, and fiercely encourages the unique, beautiful identities of those around them.

Apii zaagi'iyaang, zaagi'angidwaa. As we are loved, let us love others. Apii noojimo'iyaang, noojimo'angidwaa. As we are healed, let us heal others. Kina gibizamen maji mnowagazmen ambe dash ga mnowagazyen. We came here to be happy, so go be happy.
